Do you live or work downtown?






There are many families of alcoholics who only know despair. They are unaware that Al-Anon meetings are available to help them recover from the effects of the alcoholic's drinking.

ROAD TRIP! YOU AND YOUR BOARD CONNECT

As some of you are aware, every year the Board of Trustees for our World Service Office meet somewhere other than Virginia Beach for one for their quarterly meetings. This year they met in Seattle Washington from October 13 – 19th. Areas can submit bids a year in advance for the Trustees to meet in their Area. Some of you may remember that they met in our Area in 201 5 in Nisku. On the Saturday after the Board meeting members are invited to attend a day of connecting with the Trustees.

I was fortunate to attend this year along with Sharon F, our Delegate, and Jean H, Delegate from Saskatchewan. Janis A, Past Delegate from BC met us at the airport in Abbotsford and took us a road trip to Seattle. We joined up with 125 other members from all over Canada and the US who were excited to meet our Trustees and hear their personal sharings and news from the World Service Office.

What a day it was. There were 14 Trustees and 3 members of the Executive Committee present. All of them had time on the Agenda......it was a busy day for them. We were able to sit back and listen to their Experience, Strength and Hope, both personally and in relation to the roles they serve as Trustees. There were many times throughout the day that the presence of our Higher Power was so visible... the power of love and acceptance.

Our Regional Trustee for Canada West, Gail G. reported on her trip to the IAGSM - International Al-Anon General Services Meeting in Slovenia earlier

this fall. 23 countries were represented from 5 continents. She spoke about our principles and how they are universal. She had so many interesting stories to share with us; the one that struck me the most was that there are 20 Alateen Groups in Poland and 1 Chat line. They have been invited to do a presentation at their Parliament. You can read more about this meeting on the al-anon.org website or the details will be in the 2020 Conference Summary!

Alateen is...

- Part of Al-Anon Family Groups.
- A fellowship of young people whose lives have been affected by alcoholism in a family member or close friend.
- Members of Al-Anon Family Groups who study and apply the Al-Anon/Alateen twelve steps and twelve traditions to their own lives.

Alateen is not...

- A program for young people seeking sobriety.
- A therapy program.

WHAT IS AN AMIAS AND WHAT DO THEY DO?

- Is an Al-Anon member who is directly responsible for Alateens while being of service to Alateen
- All AMIAS have been certified by their Al-Anon Area
- Provide direction to assure that emphasis is placed on the Al-Anon program of recovery
- To the best of their ability, maintain an atmosphere that will protect the Alateen members from physical and emotional harm
- Encourage Alateens to keep order and take responsibility for themselves and the meeting

Public "Inreach"—Sharing the Hope of Alateen in Al-Anon

I volunteered to be an Alateen Group Sponsor when a high school guidance counselor contacted Al-Anon. The counselor knew about Alateen and had five students to refer to an Alateen group, which then formed very quickly out of necessity. The Alateens were all beginners. I was new both to Alateen service and to feeling feelings I hadn't felt since childhood or my teen years as I listened to the teens share at meetings.

I made numerous announcements within Al-Anon and A.A., placed ads in the local newspaper, and participated in a radio interview. Yet, no new teens came to the group. The outcome was that the group closed because its five members graduated from high school and it was without new members. Perhaps

Al-Anon's best kept secret is that there is help and hope for our children in Alateen.

The Alateen group I sponsored left an imprint on my heart. Later, my career at the World Service Office (WSO) began as the Alateen Assistant. Today, I respond to inquiries from mental health professionals and communicate with national non-profit and governmental organizations that provide services to teens. My assignments often include collaboration with the Group Services/Alateen Staff, and I am also a certified Al-Anon Member Involved in Alateen Service. However, the WSO's outreach efforts are national in scope. Real recovery for teens happens at local Alateen meetings.

I think the best way for Al-Anon members to support Alateen is by encouraging the teens in their families to attend Alateen. Public "inreach" within Al-Anon is just as important as Public Outreach in our communities to help Alateen continue to exist and thrive. I am grateful to see the Alateens rushing through the doors of my home group into their weekly meeting. They are receiving the help and hope that I wish I had received at their age.

Dear Working on my recovery,

There are lots of ways to be of service in Al-Anon and many require only small time commitments. You could start by chairing a meeting, welcoming a newcomer, setting up for a meeting, or volunteering to help with a workshop. I've found many ways to add service to my recovery, and the results have helped me discover deeper personal growth. An Al-Anon Concept says participation is the key to harmony!

Dear Sponsor,

My adult son has asked to move back into my home after twenty years on his own. I feel worried and scared of the change, and I'm not sure what to do or say. I want to tell him what to do to improve his situation, but my limited experience in Al-Anon tells me to stop and to reach out to you instead.

Sincerely, Frustrated

Dear Frustrated,

That sounds difficult for both of you. Challenging situations can make it hard to remember to focus on yourself and your Al-Anon recovery, so I'm glad you reached out. For me, I find writing in my journal helps me clarify my thoughts. I also ask my Higher Power to help me see His will for me. Talking to others in the program is also valuable. I find hope in the Al-Anon closing that says, 'Whatever your problems, there are those among us who have had them, too.' I encourage you to work your Al-Anon program one day at a time, read Al-Anon literature, and call me or other members as you work towards a solution.

Through to the Other Side

Prior to attending my first Al-Anon meeting, I often wondered why things happen the way they do. Why do I always seem to be digging myself out of one mess or another? I can't remember a time before Al-Anon that didn't include chaos. Life as a teenager was not easy—dealing with bullies at school. For others, their homes were their sanctuaries away from that abuse. But for me, living with an alcoholic, it was not sanctuary at all. I would come home and be bullied by my father. The same cruel things I heard at school I heard at home. If I was lucky, I would escape to my room before he went off. The pattern of fleeing, along with my low self esteem, led me to a revolving cycle of bad decisions and digging out.

I remember my mother telling me to "count my blessings" and I often couldn't understand what blessings she was talking about. It took me decades to figure it out. They say hindsight is 20/20 and I have to say they are 100% correct. Looking back at all the mess and chaos in my life, I can reflect on some of the positive things that have led me to where I am today. One day I learned that my wife, who went to visit her mother, decided that she and the kids were not coming back. Devastated, I responded by escaping into a dark place which resulted in a demotion at work. This demotion was the catalyst for me to pack up everything I owned and drive 2,000 miles across the country to at least try to be a dad to my kids. I was able to find work in Michigan and begin regular visitation with my children.

I then met a woman who traveled even farther—8,500 miles from an island in the South Pacific—who

stole my heart. Our relationship blossomed, and she introduced me to her employer, who later became my employer where I learned to love marketing. We were married, and my children were in the wedding. Shortly thereafter, my ex-wife found herself in a situation where she could no longer care for our children and we were awarded custody. So then I found myself with a new job, a new bride, a new baby, and my kids moving in with us. I thought everything would be perfect, but little did I know that chaos would almost consume our family. My children did not respect my wife, and it became a constant battle until the day both kids moved out.

Without Al-Anon, it would have been impossible to find gratitude through all that chaos. But since attending Al-Anon meetings, I must give credit where credit is due. I am most grateful that my Higher Power has been with me throughout it all, even when I didn't know any better. My Higher Power needed me to travel across the country and for my wife to travel to the other side of the world so we could meet and so that I could kick-start my life, which included a new career. He allowed my children to test our marriage, and it showed us that we were unbreakable. My Higher Power gave me new tools with each challenge, including the one that led me to the World Service Office. I am forever grateful.
